CHAPTER 2008-160

Senate Bill No. 366

An act relating to elderly persons and disabled adults; amending s. 825.102, F.S.; reclassifying the offense of aggravated abuse of an elderly person or disabled adult from a second-degree felony to a first-degree felony; amending s. 921.0022, F.S., relating to the offense severity ranking chart of the Criminal Punishment Code, to conform; creating s. 943.17296, F.S., relating to training on identifying and investigating elder abuse for certified law enforcement officers; requiring that the training be completed by a time certain; providing that an officer's certification becomes inactive in certain circumstances related to the failure to complete the training; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (2) of section 825.102, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

825.102 Abuse, aggravated abuse, and neglect of an elderly person or disabled adult; penalties.—

(2) "Aggravated abuse of an elderly person or disabled adult" occurs when a person:

(a) Commits aggravated battery on an elderly person or disabled adult;

(b) Willfully tortures, maliciously punishes, or willfully and unlawfully cages, an elderly person or disabled adult; or

(c) Knowingly or willfully abuses an elderly person or disabled adult and in so doing causes great bodily harm, permanent disability, or permanent disfigurement to the elderly person or disabled adult.

A person who commits aggravated abuse of an elderly person or disabled adult commits a felony of the <u>first second</u> degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.

Section 2. Paragraph (h) of subsection (3) of section 921.0022, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

Section 3. Section 943.17296, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

943.17296 Training in identifying and investigating elder abuse and neglect.—Each certified law enforcement officer must successfully complete training on identifying and investigating elder abuse and neglect as a part of the basic recruit training of the officer required in s. 943.13(9) or continuing education under s. 943.135(1) before June 30, 2011. The training shall be developed in consultation with the Department of Elderly Affairs and the Department of Children and Family Services and must incorporate instruction on the identification of and appropriate responses for persons suffering

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from dementia and on identifying and investigating elder abuse and neglect. If an officer fails to complete the required training, his or her certification is inactive until the employing agency notifies the commission that the officer has completed the training.

Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 2008.
